National Library, Information and Knowledge Services

The Online Content Services and Rauemi Developer – te ao Māori is responsible for supporting the development of online te reo Māori and te ao Māori rauemi and services to support teachers and learners. The purpose of this role is to strengthen our commitment to Māori learners to provide services that support the equitable access to library services for all young New Zealanders. This role will draw on the collections of the National Library of New Zealand and will work collaboratively with other national culture, heritage and education agencies and key partners to increase the availability of relevant quality digital resources to support teaching and learning.

The Online Content Services and Rauemi Developer – te ao Māori rauemi will build relationships across the library and education sector and will contribute to the Online Service Development Programme for Services to Schools.

Working effectively with Māori

Te Aka Taiwhenua – our Māori Strategic Framework – enables us to work effectively with Māori. Te Aka Taiwhenua is underpinned by our mātāpono – Kotahitanga, Manaakitanga, Whānaungatanga, He Tāngata.

As DIA is an agent of the Crown, Te Tiriti o Waitangi/The Treaty of Waitangi is important to everything we say or do. We recognise it as an enduring document central to New Zealand's past, present and future. Building and maintaining meaningful relationships is important to work effectively with Māori, stakeholders and other agencies. We accept our privileged role and responsibility of holding and protecting the Treaty of Waitangi / Te Tiriti o Waitangi.

The Department has entered into Whakaaetanga (single relationship agreements) with iwi leaders and Te Ara Taonga agencies in the culture and heritage sector. This signifies a commitment to work together as the taonga sector in good faith alongside iwi to develop work programmes and shared activities and to share expertise between parties to preserve taonga held by iwi and grow iwi capability.

- Contribute in-depth knowledge of the New Zealand curricula and teaching and learning practice in New Zealand to develop content curation and online curriculum resource services
- Lead the development and production of te reo Māori and te ao Māori content and rauemi for online curriculum services.
- Manage the effective design and testing of rauemi for projects and programmes.
- Contribute in-depth expertise and knowledge to the development of curriculum focused targeted programmes in collaboration with the National Capability and Reading Services teams
- Use of best practice project methodology approaches to deliver online services in a timely, cost-effective and efficient manner.
- Provide advice and support in identifying and developing effective structures and tools for presenting online content in a way that best supports learning.

- The development of high quality te reo Māori and te ao Māori online learning and heritage resources are available to support teaching and learning programmes and receive high use and positive feedback from users.
- The Online Development Plan for Services to Schools achieves its targets and provides quality curated content to support learning.
- Expertise is recognised and sought after for collaborative curriculum development.

Relationship building

- Collaborative working relationships with other members in the Online Services team and Services to Schools staff, and other teams across the National Library (managers and staff in DNZ, Content Services, ATL, etc.)
